Cllr Saunders welcomed all present to the meeting and explained that everyone had access to a copy of the Annual Town Meeting Report 2023/2024.

It was noted that a digital copy of the report is available on the Town Council's website.

1. APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence were received and noted from Councillor Cave.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the Annual Town Meeting dated 24th May 2023, were confirmed and approved as a true record and duly signed. Proposed by Cllr Harris, Seconded by Cllr Taylor

Resolved: Majority Approved

3. THE MAYOR'S REPORT

The mayor commented that the Annual Town Meeting Reports for 2023/24 were available for residents within the documentation provided, it was noted that reports from Council Committees, Lydney's County and District Councillors, Bathurst Park & Recreation Trust, Lydney Recreation Trust and various community organisations were included.

4. PUBLIC QUESTIONS/COMMENTS

(i) Youth Groups – a resident asked how the council planned to tackle the apparent lack of facilities for the younger generation within Lydney commenting further that the youth have nowhere to go meaning they hang around the town, this can lead to anti-social behaviour.

RESPONSE: The Council highlighted that Lydney was activity rich with youth clubs and groups including multiple sports, music, dance and cadets to name a few. The Lydney Youth Hub is still active and currently based at the Cricket Club after moving out of the Community Centre. Lydney Youth Hub is seeking volunteers to help run the club. It was noted that the council had invested 3 years ago into the Lydney Youth Hub. The difficulty was that not all young people were interested in joining local groups despite trying to engage with them.

COMMENT: Local Police Officer commented that the neighbourhood and PCSO Teams regularly engage with any youths they see whilst walking through the town, and they actively encourage them to engage with local available groups.

COMMENT: A resident commented that in order to volunteer to work with youth groups a GDPR test and Police check were needed and this deterred some people from volunteering.

(ii) Speeding Traffic - a resident raised concerns relating to the speed at which cars travel through the town with no apparent current control in place. The resident felt a speed camera that showed your speed when entering the town at Highfield Road would be more appropriate than the current cameras in-situ. The resident had raised his concerns to local Police Community Support Officers and Highways with no success.

RESPONSE: The council noted that currently there were 2 Vehicle Activated Sign cameras when entering Lydney by Highfield Road, one by the junction to Kimberley Drive and one towards the bottom of the hill to raise awareness of the 20mph speed limit throughout the town.

Council holds regular Highways meetings with representatives from both Gloucestershire County Council and Highways and has agreed to raise the concerns at the May meeting. The outcomes will be shared following the meeting.

COMMENT: The local Police Officer commented that the speed van was situated midway on Highfield today (24.04.24) and that the local Neighbourhood Police Team do go out to enforce speeding traffic.

(iii) Severn Way Walk – a resident queried if the council were aware of a developing walkway that eventually will link into Gloucester paths.

The resident commented that there is strong interest in walking within the area and a

The resident commented that there is strong interest in walking within the area and a recent walking festival with 2 walks starting from Lydney which was well attended and supported. The improved paths would encourage people into Lydney.

RESPONSE: The council commented that the pathways fall under the Public Right of Ways team based with Gloucestershire County Council. The council will look into this further at the upcoming Highways meeting, including current signage.

5. CLOSE

Cllr Saunders thanked the organisations for their contributions to the Annual Town Meeting Report 2023/2024.

Cllr Saunders encouraged residents to visit the stalls situated around the room, and to speak with the Royal British Legion about the 6th June D-Day Commemoration and other events.

The meeting closed at 6.32pm.

Mayor's Report

This May marks the completion of my fourth year serving as a Lydney Town Councillor, during which I am currently in my third term as Town Mayor.

For the first time during my tenure as a councillor, our office is fully staffed, marking a milestone in our operational efficiency.

I am immensely appreciative of another year working alongside my highly supportive and dedicated Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Roger Holmes.

Furthermore, I extend my gratitude to our exceptional team of Committee Chairs for their dedication and contributions.

During this period, we have welcomed new additions to our council, including Sue Hiller, Tracey Lindsay and Mark Howard.

Despite these positive developments, we still have a few vacant positions on the council due to the resignation of several councillors. Therefore, if you are interested in serving as a town councillor, we warmly encourage you to contact us. We are available to discuss the role with you and offer guidance and support throughout the application process to join Lydney Town Council.

Lydney Town Council is in the final stages in the revision of our Neighbourhood Development Plan, spearheaded by former councillor Anne Harley and the steering group Anne's steadfast leadership of the NDP steering group ensures both continuity and acknowledges the considerable effort she and her team have invested in this plan. We will shortly begin our consultation period before it goes for verification from the Forest of Dean District Council, it will then become our live legal document.

Since last May, we have some fantastic events for the community which have been supported incredibly. We started off on Thursday 6th June 2024 with the 80th anniversary of D-Day. We celebrated by having a short ceremony under our flagpole at the offices and then with the lighting of the beacon in the evening on The Mesne. This was our first chance to showcase a community project we've been working on called the poppy project.

Members from all aspects of the community have been knitting. Crafting crocheting red poppies which we attach to netting to drape over areas of the time to commemorate the fields of poppies.

We showcased this at The Mesne during the lighting of the beacon and then later on in the year this was transferred to the Cross for the Remembrance Parade and the display continued onto Bathurst Park railings and other areas of the route, including the church.

It was a fantastic collaboration of old and young and all abilities to create a lasting reminder of the sacrifices those gave to our country.

We had our community event at Bathurst Park July, which is growing in popularity year on year.

The feedback from this event is always very positive and we are glad to be able to provide this to bring the community together and engage with them by showing both our old and new residents, the exciting groups, clubs and organisations that support our time and its residents.

It is a continual privilege for me to lay the wreath at the war memorial on Remembrance Sunday.

The procession and attendance remained profoundly humbling, as always.

From feedback received from the public and the groups that we work with, we changed the route back to a shorter but more historic route to enable more user groups to be able to join us.

I extend my sincere gratitude to the Royal British Legion for their invaluable assistance and guidance in coordinating this significant civic ceremony.

No one could have anticipated the devastation that struck our town on Sunday 24th November 2024.

Storm Bert hit Lydney with tremendous force, resulting in the worst flooding the town has experienced since 1962.

Over 30 homes and a similar number of businesses suffered varying degrees of water damage. Some properties remain uninhabitable, and a number of businesses have still not reopened.

This was an unprecedented event that affected every aspect of our community, financially, mentally, and economically.

It was, without a doubt, the lowest point of my year.

As a town council, we are limited in what we are able to do as the lowest tier of government, yet the desire to help individuals, families, businesses, and the wider community has never been stronger.

The damage across the town has been extensive. The continued closure of Newerne Street, due to both flood damage and a car crash a week later, remains a significant issue.

The ongoing disruption caused by traffic lights, barriers, and signage is creating chaos for shoppers and businesses alike, all while we await vital repairs to restore normality and vibrancy.

Despite the hardship, there have been some positives. Our food bank, which lost stock during the flood, was able to secure a permanent home, a real benefit to both the organisation and the wider community.

Most importantly, the resilience and solidarity shown by our residents was truly heartening.

The way our community came together to support one another was inspirational, and that spirit is the most meaningful takeaway from this difficult period.

A definite highlight of the year was the visit from HRH The Princess Royal, on Wednesday 26th February 2025, who came specifically to meet flood victims, local business owners, and residents, as well as to visit the Town Council. It was an incredible experience.

While a great deal of work went on behind the scenes to make the visit happen, it brought a real sense of pride and recognition to the town.

Her Royal Highness showed genuine compassion, energy, and enthusiasm for supporting our recovery. She spent time engaging with homeowners, businesses, and members of the public, asking insightful questions of the authorities involved in the response and recovery efforts. Her interest and care were deeply appreciated and made a lasting impression.

I would like to extend special thanks to Vice Lord-Lieutenant Roger Deeks, his team at Gloucestershire County Council, and the Lieutenancy Office for their invaluable support, guidance, and help with the protocols and etiquette surrounding such a high-profile visit. In addition to visiting the Town Council, The Princess Royal also visited Jones Food Company and Taurus Crafts, where I had the privilege of meeting her once again.

Early December we hosted our Annual Light Switch-on Parade and Christmas event at Lydney Town Hall, which despite challenges with a shortened route due to the flooding impact in the town and with only a week after the flooding, proved to be a success. It was a difficult to muster the same enthusiasm as in past years because of this economic hardship and devastation around us from the flooding the week previous. But we had to remind ourselves we were doing this for the children and we need some sense of normality for families. Even though at the time it felt really difficult and at times wrong to be celebrating when so much was going wrong within the town.

This year, the procession continues grow and change. We didn't have the dancers this year due to other commitments but we did have representation from car clubs featuring lit up vehicles and floats and illuminated creations.

In response to feedback from the public, we made adjustments to this year's event. We shifted the date from a Friday to a Saturday to minimise disruption to the high street and allow other groups with time constraints on Fridays to participate. This change aims to encourage even greater community participation, as weekends typically accommodate a wider range of schedules, ensuring more people can partake in and enjoy this wonderful event.

Witnessing children and families come together to create magical childhood memories during events like these is one of the most rewarding aspects of my role as a councillor.

My civic calendar has remained consistently busy this year, and it has been a real honour to represent the town at a wide range of events. Highlights have included opening new facilities at The Dean Academy and presenting the Community Shield to this year's deserving recipient. I was also proud to attend the annual Forest of Dean Civic Dinner, representing Lydney while supporting fundraising efforts for Great Oaks Hospice.

On Monday 8th July 2024, Lydney Town Council announced the appointment of three outstanding individuals to the esteemed role of Mayor's Cadet: Leading Cadet Toby Salmon of the Sea Cadet Corps; Cadet Sergeant Jess Rydeard from the Royal Air Force Air Cadets and Cadet Corporal Joshua Fearon of Lydney Army Cadet Force (ACF). The Mayor's Cadet Scheme, established in 2009 by former Mayor Councillor Martin Bowring, continues to honour exemplary young leaders from Lydney's vibrant youth organisations. I would like to thank the cadets for the work that they have done this year.

I also enjoyed attending sessions at the Aylburton Beavers and squirrels groups talking about my role as a mayor and what I do in our community. I was also invited as a guest speaker at the Forest of Dean Rotary Club and enjoyed a lunch and a speech about what I do in the community and how the community can help each other Similarly, I also was invited to the Victoria Centre to see their fantastic work they do in the community supporting the elderly and vulnerable and engaging with them socially to help alleviate isolation. I had a lovely morning and afternoon with them and I'm fully supportive of the work they do.

While it isn't always possible to accept every invitation, I make every effort to attend as many events as I can in support of our community.

At the time of writing this report, we were about to host our Annual Easter Event though it hasn't happened yet as it's later this year. We are looking forward to spending time with families and children and celebrating the Easter.

We are also busy preparing for the anniversary of VE Day 80 with another lighting of the beacon and displaying our poppy project, at The Mesne, on Thursday 8th May 2025.

Amenities Report

It has been a particularly busy year for the Town Council, and the Amenities Committee has played a key role in much of the work that has taken place.

Our Grounds Team continues to do an outstanding job across the town—maintaining green spaces, tending to planters, and adding welcome bursts of colour throughout Lydney. Their dedication is very much appreciated.

We have continued to support community growing initiatives and planting schemes.

As part of a wider funding programme from Gloucestershire County Council all local schools received fruit bushes and trees this year, enabling them to begin developing their own community growing areas. I visited all the schools with one of our Grounds team members to help revise them on what would be suitable for each school in the areas they had.

A particular highlight was visiting Primrose Hill School earlier in the year to celebrate the opening of their new community garden—an excellent example of what these initiatives and previous grants can help achieve.

It's also wonderful to see the sensory garden officially opened and some of the plants and shrubs and trees from this initiative all come together to create a fantastic space in Bathurst Park.

As part of our remit, the Amenities Committee has supported and delivered several community events throughout the town.

These included the Easter Egg Hunt and Bonnet Parade in Bathurst Park, the D-Day beacon lighting, the Poppy Project, our fireworks display, our Christmas celebrations, and the popular Community Summer Event, also held in Bathurst Park.

We are incredibly grateful to our Events Team and our Office Administrator, Leanne, whose planning and support help bring these ideas to life.

These events are consistently well-received and remain key highlights in the town's

calendar.



We're also pleased to have progressed with improvements to play areas.

The play roundabout at Primrose Hill Mense is currently being completely replaced, and a new pathway is being installed to improve accessibility.

The equipment is on order and due to be installed in the coming weeks - just in time for the summer holidays.

In addition, fencing has been installed nearby to help protect The Mesne from further damage caused by wild boar. This will help preserve the space as a valued community area for all to enjoy.

It would be remiss not to mention the damage and devastation our town experienced in November as a result of the flooding caused by Storm Bert.

Several of our amenities were lost during the flood, including planters and public bins. These will be replaced in due course, once repairs to the affected areas—currently being carried out by other authorities - are completed.

Despite the challenges, we were honoured to be part of the Royal visit from Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal.

Her visit provided a welcome boost to the town, offering much-needed support and recognition during our economic recovery.

It was a proud moment for Lydney and a reminder of the strength and resilience of our community.

Finance and Scrutiny Report

The council is in a very secure position financially, due in part to the examination of the budgets by the relevant committees.

Council Tax

The small element of your overall tax bill which comes our way is based on a Band D property of £222.18 per annum which is an annual increase to £10.08, monthly increase of £0.84, which equates to a weekly increase of £0.19, for 2024/2025.

To offset the increase, the council is using £20,000 of its General Reserves to assist with minimising the impact on local residents.

Grants

Grants awarded:

The Council awards grants to various community bodies, usually after the consideration by the committee. The following community grants and were awarded in 2024/25: Forest Sea Cadets £600.00 awarded - Spent £425.00. Remaining Grant returned to council £175.00

Friends of Primrose Hill CofE Primary Academy £770.40
Lydney Tennis Club £1,000.00
Lydney Town Band £800.00

Reserves

The reserves have grown, some have been earmarked for specific projects and the remainder are general reserves which for use in an emergency situation and as a working balance.

The total balances and reserves at the end of the year are £539,857 General Reserves and £323,135 Earmarked Reserves.

Conclusion

So, we enter 2025/26 in a healthy position despite the uncertainty for the general economy.

Burial Committee

The most important duties of the Burial committee are to provide burial space for the residents of Lydney and to keep detailed records of who is buried where.

Lydney Burial ground is likely to be full within the next three to four years so we have been both searching for a new site and putting council funds aside to pay for the land when we find it.

In the last few years, we have identified possible sites, but one has a water table too high to pass regulations and the other piece of land proved not to be for sale to us. If we are unable to find a suitable site, legislation allows us to use a site in one of the surrounding villages, but I believe that Lydney residents would treat this as a far from satisfactory solution. Consequently, the search for a new location continues to be our top priority. The committee would also appeal to the planning authorities for 106 allocations for land for burials in any future building developments. We are also looking to be able to provide some green burial space and again our researching and trying to find some areas that could be suitable.

I would like to record our thanks and appreciation to Leanne Gay, who took on the burial administration role when the previous burial's assistant left and she has mastered the role and works fantastically with the local funeral directors to deliver an efficient service to the community.

We have added metal covers to the legs of all our memorial benches to avoid any damage caused by strimming the grass. These have also been painted by the grounds team in the spring

We have done significant repair and restoration work on the entrance to the cemetery. This involved work on both the gates and the pillars at the entrance.

Recently we have agreed a new section within the cemetery which has been named Section H. This has meant that we have been able to add an extra 70 burial plots which will extend the longevity of the cemetery.



The closed Churchyard at St Mary's has been full for a number of years and when this happens the responsibility for maintenance transfers from the Church to the Council. We have a number of table top graves in the churchyard, many of which have fallen into disrepair and because of the weight of the stones could have health and safety issues.

The Diocese has commissioned a report on the condition of these and what will be needed to make these safe, but because most of them are Grade II listed monuments we have to follow strict guidelines for any work we do on them. Before we receive this report, it is difficult to estimate the amount of work needed or its cost, but based on similar sites it is likely to cost around £20,000 over the next ten years.

Unfortunately, this report is still not been forthcoming and we have not been able to progress on any of this work. However, we still continue to set aside money to help fund the repair costs once we do know what we are dealing with.

I would like to also record my thanks to our Grounds Team who maintain the cemetery to an incredibly high standard.

Planning and Highways

I have been Chair of the Planning and Highways Committee since late 2022.

Lydney Town Council is a consultee on planning applications that are provided by the Forest of Dean District Council. We hold monthly Planning & Highways Committee meetings (apart from August) and notify the Forest of Dean District Council of the council's view on various planning applications that are submitted to us.

We are often contacted by the public regarding the state of our roads within the town and outlying areas, i.e. potholes, however the responsibility for the highways and pathways upkeep falls to Gloucestershire County Council Highways. I do however have regular meetings (approximately bi monthly) with Nathan Choat from Gloucestershire County Council Highways, Gloucestershire County Councillor Alan Preest and our Town Clerk to review issues within the town and am pleased to say that due to these meetings the resurfacing of Church Rd took place in 2024.

I am also an active member of the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) Review Steering Group liaising between LTC, the steering group (Chaired superbly by Anne Harley, who has worked tirelessly to bring the review of the NDP to fruition), the consultants that have assisted in getting the Review ready for submission to the examiners at FODDC for adoption giving us more say on future planning applications that come before this Committee.

The review of the NDP is now almost complete with some minor additions and will be put to the examiners at FODDC in the very near future for adoption after a period of consultation from 14th May until 27th June. Two public consultations will take place on 28th May from 3pm-7pm at the community centre and on the 7th June outside Lidl from 10am-2pm.

I and this Committee will continue to strive to make representation to the Forest of Dean District Council's Planning Department on your behalf over planning applications and decisions. Councillor Carol Harris

Head Groundsman Report

The Grounds Team have been very busy throughout the year keeping everywhere safe, clean and tidy. We take pride in our work and always set high standards. The wild flowers on the entrances had lots of positive comments on how beautiful the colours were shown.

The town tubs were lovely and we try to change the displays to keep everywhere looking fresh.

We were also busy enjoying planting lots of new daffodil displays, outside the Fire Station, outside the park and outside St Mary's church.

Everyone knows how hard the Grounds Team works during the growing season, but it's during the cold, dark, wet months of winter that the team continues to work just as hard — even though the work often goes unseen. These are the months when we tackle the essential tasks that prepare the grounds for the warmer seasons. We clear weeds and moss, wash surfaces to keep things looking clean, paint, prune back trees and shrubs, and make improvements like creating new flower beds. In bad weather, we also salt paths to prevent ice and put out sandbags when needed.

Lydney Recreation Trust

We are always busy working hard to maintain and improve this area. Recently, the council has employed a new member of staff, Rob, who is now based largely in this area. Rob has been very busy bringing the Recreation Ground up to the high standards we set throughout the town.

We have also installed two new flower tubs and taken over responsibility for grass cutting, helping to make the area even more beautiful for everyone to enjoy.

This is an area we take great pride in and care for meticulously. During the growing season, we mow the grass every week, ensuring we maintain the high standards we set. We also keep the area well-painted and make sure to pick up litter and fallen leaves whenever needed.

Bathurst Park

Bathurst Park is, for many, the jewel of Lydney, and we are proud to maintain the extremely high standards the park is known for.

The new Sensory Garden is maturing well and has been enjoyed by people of all ages, with children especially loving the musical instruments. Around the gardens and the pond, we have built eight new flower beds and planted new shrubs and a new hedge to enhance the beauty of the area. Everywhere is kept safe, clean, and tidy for visitors to enjoy.

Bathurst Park and Recreation Trust

It has been another busy and productive year at Bathurst Park, marked by change, exciting developments, and continued community engagement.

A significant transition took place early in the year with changes to the Trust's leadership. After many years of devoted service as Chairman, Trustee Richard Kemsley stepped into the role of Vice Chair. His dedication to the park has been invaluable, and we were grateful for his continued involvement.

I was previously Vice Chair, and was voted into the role of Chairman of the Bathurst Park and Recreation Trust.

At the start of the year Trustee Kemsley decided to resign from his post as councillor/trustee and following his departure Trustee Tracey Lindsey was vote in as the new Vice Chairman of Bathurst Park & Recreation Trust.

We would like to thank Richard for his contribution and support to Bathurst Park and the town.

One of the year's highlights was the formal opening of the Sensory Garden in August.

The garden was constructed over the winter months and is now entering its first full spring, with planting flourishing and taking shape beautifully. It's a peaceful, accessible space designed for all ages and abilities and has been warmly received by the community. We're incredibly thankful to all those who donated, sponsored, and supported the project, it truly is a wonderful addition to the park.



We were delighted to install a new Clamber Stack play structure this year. It has quickly become a favourite for children and families, who enjoy climbing, swinging, and exploring the new feature.

We are committed to continuing this approach across our play areas, updating and replacing equipment where possible. However, as always, such improvements are subject to available funding, and we will continue seeking financial support for future developments.

Another area of focus has been the fish pond, which, while maintaining excellent water quality for the fish, can appear murky.

The water itself is crystal clear when tested, but its visual presentation is less appealing. We are currently exploring solutions to improve the appearance, including planting, filtration upgrades, and lighting enhancements to create a more visually pleasing and serene environment for park users.

Bathurst Park continues to be the heart of many of Lydney's key events.

- The Easter Egg Hunt and Bonnet Parade, scheduled for Wednesday 16th April 2025
- Our Annual Community Summer Event (Lydney Community Event) held on Saturday 20th July 2024, featuring a range of local musicians, funfairs, community stands and family fun activities.
- Sportily and Kings Arms Church 1k & 5k Chairty Run, as part of the Annual Community Summer Event, with proceeds going to TIC+
- The Christmas Carol service organised by King's Arms Church with Churches Together held on Thursday 19th December 2024, who hosted their annual 'Carols at the Bandstand' event with the award winning Lydney Town Band.
- And our ever-popular Fireworks Night in November, which had over 850 people in attendance with comments from local residents such as:- "I have just come in from the fireworks display at Bathurst Park with my grandchildren. We would like to say a big thank you for a lovely evening, very well organised and a fantastic display. Thank you one again".

The income from the events will be used towards the park.

Founded in 1971, Lydney & Severnside Flower Club usually meets at Lydney Town Hall, on the second Monday of each month, from February to November each year. Doors open at 6.30pm for a 7.15pm start. Visitors are always welcome with an entry fee of £10 unless otherwise advertised.

Our year begins in March where members enrol for £65, entitling them to attend all meetings plus the AGM, free of charge, therefore saving £20 over the year. There is a member's monthly sweepstake with a cash prize, which also supports our Project Fund in aid of good causes.

Each meeting will normally include a raffle of flowers, light refreshments and a Bric a Brac stall. There is a Notice Board containing Club and other NAFAS information and members can also subscribe to our quarterly magazine `The Flower Arranger` at a subsidised cost.

Some meetings will be entertained by NAFAS demonstrators who will showcase their skills by filling the stage with beautiful and clever designs, to a theme, which are then raffled. In particular, the Open meeting in November is always a spectacular festive occasion with seasonal displays, refreshments and guest stalls.

Members can also take advantage of their associate membership of NAFAS (part of their fee) by receiving information on events run by our Area (Three Counties & South Wales) and at National level.

These include Area Days, Presidents Day and the NAFAS National Show. Information and tickets can often be obtained via the Flower Club. The Area also provides training for would-be Demonstrators, Judges, Speakers and Teachers including training days for all these disciplines plus help for competitors in flower arranging competitions.

The advantages of being a member of a local Flower Club are many and varied and include opportunities to socialise and make new friends, to learn about flower classes on offer locally, or to join in with members who regularly help out at local flower festivals and churches. Some of our Members arrange at Gloucester Cathedral and others have been invited to arrange at Westminster Abbey! The club also supports local events such as The Race for Life.

LYDNEY WAR MEMORIAL (ALMSHOUSES) TRUST ANNUAL REPORT 2025

The Lydney War Memorial (Almshouses) Trust is the body responsible for the maintenance and administration of the almshouses in Church Road, Lydney, next to the War Memorial. The properties are divided into two houses and four flats. The Trust meets every other month at the Lydney Community Centre.

Over the last year, one Trustee has resigned and has not yet been replaced. This leaves the following 6 Trustees; Mr Simon Moore, Mrs Ruth Richardson, Mrs Lynn Daszko, Mrs. Susan Holmes, Ms. Laura-Jade Schroeder and Mr Timothy Enbom.

At the last AGM Mr Simon Moore agreed to continue to act as Chair and Mr Timothy Enbom agreed to continue to act as Vice Chair. Gill Moir remains the clerk and administrative officer for the Trust.

During the past 12 months, two of the Trust's residents sadly passed away, leaving one 3-bedroom house and one first floor flat vacant. A significant programme of renovation was carried out on these units including new kitchens, bathroom fittings, decorating and new carpets. The Trust advertised the vacant properties locally in the press and on social media and received a huge amount of interest. After a careful selection process, a couple was chosen for the 3-bedroom house and another person for the one-bedroom flat. Both moved in during February 2025.

The Trust has continued to manage its finances effectively, carefully planning projects and maintenance work within ongoing income levels, aiming to keep a constant and modest level of reserves. The houses are in a good state of repair and any problems which come up are resolved as soon as possible. The next Quinquennial Survey is due in July 2026. As part of their succession planning, the current board of Trustees are keen to encourage anyone who would be interested in becoming a Trustee to contact the Trust.

The Friends of Bathurst Pool

We recently held our 25th Annual General Meeting and are delighted to say that Bathurst Pool goes from strength to strength with cold water swimming constantly becoming more popular.

We enjoyed another good year despite a lot of poor weather. Adult attendance increased by 12.1% and child attendance by 16.4%. We had five days during the season when we reached full capacity and a one out one in system was operated. There were increases in our running costs but we were able to keep the same prices as the previous year for both adult and child entrance and for swim club. These will also be the same for the coming season.

During the season we purchased a new pool cleaner, a pool cover, two gazebos, more picnic tables, various shop equipment and a disabled hoist. The hoist was partially funded with a £3000 grant from The Gloucestershire County Council Build Back Better fund and a generous donation of £1000 from Kiely Carpets.

We have now built up a healthy reserve fund which needs to be maintained in case of a major breakdown in the very old filtration system but I am happy to say that all is currently working well. Painting, cleaning and some repair work is currently being undertaken and we will be ready to open up on 1st May for swim club members, followed by opening to the general public on 24th May.

Trustees, volunteers, swim club members and many others are all looking forward to another great season at Bathurst Pool.

Thanks to our lovely cook Pam, who has now been working with us for over 20 years, very tasty two course meals are provided 3 days a week for approximately 100 diners. Carol, our dedicated Manager who has now been with us for 12 years, works so hard to make the Centre the success that it is and has a very special relationship with our diners and volunteers.

Christmas Day 2024 was another special day for so many people who enjoyed a tasty lunch, entertainment and the chance for many of them not to spend that day alone. Many of the volunteers for Christmas Day come back to help us year after year and they work so hard to make it special. The Centre is always beautifully decorated for so many events throughout the year Valentines Day, Easter, Rememberance Day and this year for the special VE day celebrations together with our 50th anniversary.

In 2023 we received grants from Awards for all, Lydney Town Council and the Coventry Building Society for the full refurbishment of all three of our toilets and to improve accessibility. 
